Honoring Carl B. Kern

- An extensive biographical history of Carl B. Kern has been compiled on the Fund's website (www.kernfund.org), from his birth in 1880 to his tragic death in 1917, including links to newspaper articles and YMCA archives highlighting the following:
- The Kern family was one of the four founding families of Germantown, Ohio – originally natives of Berks County, Pennsylvania – who permanently settled in the area in 1804.
- Carl B. Kern graduated from Germantown High School in 1898. He served as a tool maker apprentice in Dayton before traveling to Cleveland to become the Assistant Secretary for the West Side Y.M.C.A under M.D. Crackel. He then attended the Y.M.C.A. College in Springfield, MA, graduating in 1907.
- Carl B. Kern was recruited by the Poughkeepsie, N.Y. Y.M.C.A. to lead its Boys' Dept. His impact on youth became clear. After he announced in 1909 that he would be accepting the job of Boys' Work Secretary for the Dayton Y.M.C.A. starting in September, a send-off reception included touching testimonials and a "loving cup" as a memento of affection.

The Impact of Camp Ozone

In a September 20, 1915 report of the Boys' Work Secretary to the Dayton Y.M.C.A. Board of Trustees, C.B. Kern wrote, "The spirit demonstrated throughout the camp will mean much for the entire work and without doubt will prove lasting... This speaks much for the splendid location and the permanent equipment already developed. **More of permanent value can be accomplished with a week in camp with a boy than months of casual contact.**"

Report of the Boys' Work Secretary
to
the Board of Trustees, Sept. 20, 1915

The work of the summer has been interesting as usual and gratifying in more ways than one. The summer being a rainy one made the building more than ever necessary.


698 Members September 1. 822 books were issued during July and August. 1010 boys attended the various bible classes during the two months. Baths and Gym attendance averaged over 1500 each month. Membership earnings to September 1, \$571.70 - \$130.00 ahead of last year. 144 boys attended camp.

The spirit demonstrated throughout the camp will mean much for the entire work and will without doubt prove lasting. This speaks much for the splendid location and the permanent equipment already developed. More of permanent value can be accomplished with a week in camp with a boy than months of casual contact.

We were successful in securing Mr. S. C. Britton as Boys' Physical Director who began his work September 1.

Our Department Annual has been prepared and will be out next week. The work is opening up splendidly and from all indications this year ought to break all records.

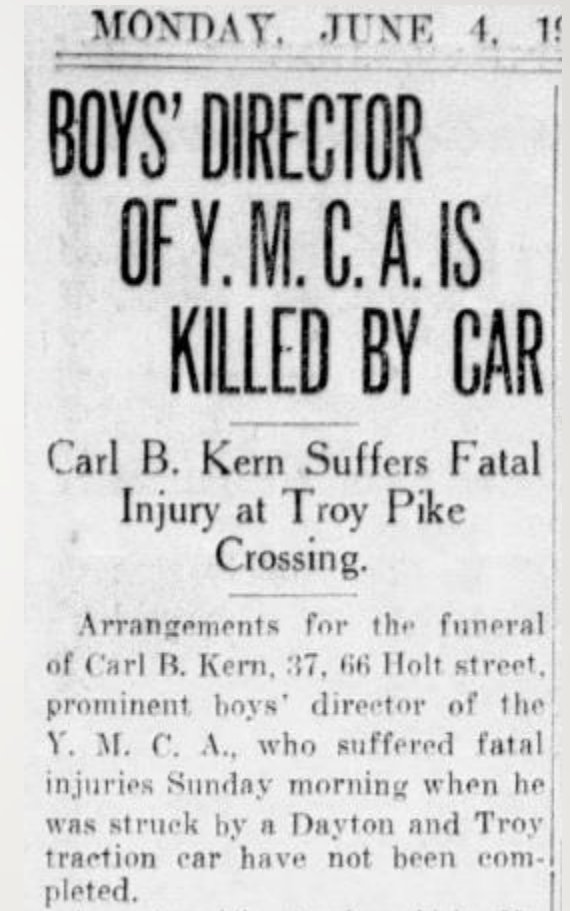

The Accident – June 3, 1917

“An automobile truck, which Mr. Kern was driving, was struck by the 11 o'clock north bound [Dayton and Troy traction] car on the Troy pike just north of the city. Mr. Kern was thrown beneath the wheels of the car and suffered injuries which caused his death in Miami Valley hospital at 3:30 Sunday afternoon.” - *The Dayton Herald*, 4 Jun 1917, page 3.



The Tributes

June 4th - Editorial - "A Friend of the Boys" - "Carl B. Kern sought no greater honor than to be accounted worthy the friendship of the hundreds of young fellows who were under his personal care and attention in the boys' department of the Y.M.C.A.... Camp Ozone, at Ft. Ancient, where hundreds of these full-of-life young chaps were accustomed to spend their vacation days, will stand as a permanent memorial to the aggressive activities of Mr. Kern.... And so today the boys of the Y.M.C.A. are grieving because one of their number has gone away. It will be a rather difficult task to fill the vacancy that Carl Kern's death has created. His loss is a personal one in hundreds of Dayton homes." - *Dayton Daily News*, 4 Jun 1917, page 6.



Tribute Booklet Printed in 1918

“It is quite impossible in a small space – or even a large one – to do justice to a great character.... The life of Carl B. Kern will never be adequately written, yet it is very real. It was ‘caught’ by the boys whom he touched and goes on re-infecting those whom they touch. The power of his example, the results of his efforts are as the bit of yeast that is saved after each baking to leaven all the succeeding loaves.

However, it was thought fitting to publish a few dates and facts and especially some pictures so that his friends would have some material keep-sake of him.”

BOOKLET HONORS LATE C. B. KERN

In honor of the late C. B. Kern, boys' work director of the Y. M. C. A., who lost his life in an automobile accident last June, boys of the department have issued a little booklet. It will be distributed among all the boys in the department.

The booklet contains a photograph of “C. B.,” who was “a friend of every kid in town,” together with pictures of Camp Kern at Fort Ancient, which the secretary founded. Mrs. C. B. Kern helped to prepare the booklet.

And So the Tradition Continues...

- In September of 1917, the Dayton Y.M.C.A. board of directors votes to rename Camp Ozone to Camp Kern to honor Carl B. Kern.
- Seventy years later, in November of 1987, The Carl B. Kern Fund is established to honor Carl B. Kern and provide financial support to continue his work in perpetuity.

TO NAME CAMP FOR SECRETARY

Y. M. C. A. Directors Honor the
Memory of Late Carl B.
Kern, Former Worker.

As a memorial to Carl B. Kern, Y. M. C. A. boys' work secretary, who was killed in an automobile accident on the Troy pike several months ago, the association camp known as Camp Ozone near Fort Ancient, has been changed to Camp Kern.

This action was taken at a meeting of the board of directors of the association Monday night.

Camp Ozone was made possible through the efforts of Mr. Kern and is one of the best association camps in the state.

Background – The Dayton Foundation

- The Dayton Foundation is a non-profit tax-exempt community foundation, established in 1921 with an initial \$250,000 donation by the Patterson family (John H. Patterson, Julia Shaw Patterson Carnell, and Robert Patterson), and currently celebrating its 100th Anniversary.
- As of June 30, 2020, the Foundation administered nearly **4,000** Funds, had \$652.7 million in assets, and totaled \$66 million in grants and charitable distributions for the 2019-20 fiscal year.
- The Dayton Foundation is **second** among all community foundations nationwide in the number of charitable funds under management and the number of grants awarded - more than community foundations in New York City, Los Angeles and Chicago.
- **FUN FACT #1** – Don Battelle served as the Foundation’s first director from 1930 through 1973. He also attended Camp Ozone in 1912 and later became an assistant to Carl B. Kern after graduating from Steele High School in 1914.
- **FUN FACT #2** – In 1943, the Foundation provided \$400 to help finance camping for underprivileged boys at Camp Kern, as announced by Dayton YMCA Boys’ Work Secretary William Young.

Background – Excerpts from The Fund Agreement

- In November, 1987, The Carl B. Kern Fund was established with an initial gift of \$1,000 by Stuart T. Weinberg, MD with the support of C.B. Kern nephew George E. Kuhn and niece Mary Kuhn Sigel (one of **124** funds at the time).
- “The Fund was established in honor of Carl B. Kern, for the exclusive purpose of furthering his ideals and areas of interest, primarily camping, other youth activities, and the outdoors.”
- “In order to carry out the purpose enumerated above, net income of the Fund shall be distributed not less often than annually to the organization responsible for the management of Camp Kern to be used solely for supporting camper scholarships and defraying the operational and capital expenses of Camp Kern.”
- The Fund is overseen by an Advisory Board, “who shall each have demonstrated a commitment to pursue the interests and ideals of Carl B. Kern.”

The Carl B. Kern Fund – Results, as of August 4, 2021

- When established with a **\$1,000** gift, the Initial Donor specified in the Fund Agreement, “It is my hope and expectation that other individuals, corporations and organizations will seek to further this purpose by adding to the Fund.”
- Over **\$480,000** has been raised from over **1,000** donations and bequests.
- There have been 4 estate gifts, from **George E. Kuhn, Roz Young, Mary Kuhn Sigel, and Robert Salisbury.**
- Nearly **\$217,000** has been distributed to YMCA Camp Kern on behalf of the Fund, including a check for **\$20,000** in 2021.
- The balance of the Fund as of June 30th, 2021 was **\$543,431.52.**

The Carl B. Kern Fund – Use of Distributions

Since the first distribution check of \$201 was presented to then Executive Director **Larry Maxwell** at camp's Strawberries and Ice Cream event in June, 1989, funds have been used for many purposes, among them:

- Providing support for camper scholarships requests.
- Supporting Kern camper/staff participation in World Camp '94 and '98
- Contributing to the Camp Kern Lodge Renovation Campaign.
- Providing partial funding for directional signage and the Climbing Tower
- Contributing to the Harry Schiewetz Assembly Hall (Carl B. Kern Auditorium)
- Contributing to the Charles Snyder Recreation Hall
- Supporting the 2021 Circle K Ranch Improvement project including "Sponsor a Stall"
